HOW TO REGISTER FOR SUMMER COURSES

ATTENTION, CURRENTLY ENROLLED STUDENTS:

- Summer semester registration dates and procedures are different from those for the fall and spring semesters.
- A separate application for financial aid — the JSC Summer 2012 Financial Aid Application & Payment Form on page 13 — is required in addition to the usual FAFSA application.

DEGREE-SEEKING UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS:

Register March 26-May 19 online, or in person, by mail, or by fax using the registration form in this bulletin.

DEGREE-SEEKING GRADUATE STUDENTS:

Register March 26-July 2 online, or in person, by mail or by fax using the registration form in this bulletin unless otherwise noted.

NON-DEGREE-SEEKING UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS:

Register March 30-May 9 in person, by mail, or by fax using the registration form in this bulletin; unless otherwise noted.

NON-DEGREE-SEEKING GRADUATE STUDENTS:

Register March 30-May 9 in person, by mail, or by fax using the registration form in this bulletin unless otherwise noted.

Completed registration forms may be dropped off at the Registrar's Office in Martinetti Hall; mailed to Registrar's Office, Johnson State College, 337 College Hill, Johnson, VT 05656; or faxed to 802-635-1409.

The registration, add/drop and withdrawal deadlines for summer courses can be found in the "Deadlines & Details" column in this bulletin or on the Web via the Portal (select Web Services, then "Search for Sections" and detail into the "Section Name and Title" column of each course). SUMMER HOUSING

Some on-campus housing is available for students taking summer courses. We encourage you to reserve summer housing by May 1 to ensure a space and roommate choice. Space will be allotted, where available, for requests that come in after May 1. Students using summer housing for academic purposes must be registered for and attending class(es) while present in the residence halls. Arrival for academic summer housing is the day before a course begins; departure is by noon the day after the course ends. Rates: Full summer, term, and/or weekly rates available. Please contact the Residence Life Office in Dewey Hall (Room 158) or call 635-1200 for housing rates, for a Summer Housing Contract, and for questions about summer housing policies, procedures and availability. Please note that ARAMARK food services is not open for some parts of the summer. Students living in the residence hall will have access to kitchen facilities to make their own meals if they wish. There also are local food establishments and restaurants in Johnson and nearby towns.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO KNOW • IMPORTANT THINGS TO DO

Please familiarize yourself with JSC policies and procedures, which are posted online at: www.jsc.edu/policiesandprocedures.

OFFICIAL JSC COMMUNICATIONS & OTHER FUNCTIONS ARE CONDUCTED PRIMARILY ONLINE. JSC uses email to communicate official business to students. Upon registration, you will be provided a free JSC email account. **It is your responsibility to stay up to date with email sent to your JSC email account. If you choose to forward your JSC email to another email address, you remain responsible for the contents of any official message, including attachments, sent by the College.** In addition, you are expected to use VSC Web Services to access class schedules, unofficial transcripts and grade reports.

Within 48 hours of registering for a course, all students will have access to the Portal, JSC email and VSC Web Services. (See box.)

As mandated by federal law, students who are U.S. citizens must provide their Social Security Number when registering for the first time. (This requirement does not apply to students enrolled in contract courses paid for by an external entity.) Your SSN is closely guarded and kept in strict confidence by the Vermont State Colleges.

Many instructors use the online Portal system to post assignments and supplemental course materials. If you are taking online or hybrid courses, you may be required to regularly access the course through the Portal (Hybrid courses are courses that are conducted partly online and partly in class.)

ACCESSING THE PORTAL, EMAIL & VSC WEB SERVICES

Before you can access the Portal, JSC email and VSC Web Services, you must activate your account. This should be done before the semester starts. If you experience difficulties accessing your account, submit a request for assistance to the Help Desk at <http://helpdesk.vsc.edu>.

The Portal:

If you have previously used the Portal: Log on to your Portal account. Click on the “Change Password” under “Tools” at the left. Follow the online instructions to change your password. This process will activate your JSC network and email accounts and apply your new password to all of your accounts.

If you are using the Portal for the first time: Go to <http://myjsc.jsc.edu>. Click on the blue login button, then the “Activate my account” tab at the top. You will need to provide your College ID number and the last 4 digits of your SSN. Follow the online instructions to set a password, which will activate all of your accounts. Your user name will be listed on the page after you activate your account.

EMAIL:

To access your email account through the Portal, click on the email link at the left of the screen after logging into the Portal.

VSC WEB SERVICES:

To access VSC Web Services, log on to the Portal (<http://myjsc.jsc.edu>), select the VSC Web Services box at left, then select the “Students” tab.

Two hotly debated issues in herbalism today, the licensing of practicing herbalists and the therapeutic use of standardized extracts will be discussed. The study of herbalism also embraces the study of all body systems, the herbal materia medica and lifestyle choices that support each system. Practical use of herbs in this course is experienced through demonstrations of making of compresses/poultices, and teas: infusions and decoctions, campus walks to view medicine plants in various habitats, and the class lab activity, tincture-making. TOPICAL SEMINAR: GLOBAL HEALTH ISSUES

Students explore the nature and distribution of disease, health and wellness. We will also compare diverse allopathic and alternative treatment models used in countries around the globe. In the U.S., health is defined by conventional allopathic medicine as "the absence of disease". This contrasts with the World Health Organization definition used by most nations, the world that defines health as a balance of mind, body, and spirit and the presence of wellness. While chronic diseases such as cancer, heart disease and diabetes are frequently found in developed nations including the U.S., Canada and Great Britain, infectious diseases such as malaria, polio, and tuberculosis are the diseases of developing nations. TOPICAL SEMINAR: HERBS AS VITAL HEALERS

The goal of this course is to empower students to properly identify and prepare a wide range of North American medicinal plants. Course meetings are packed with hands-on exploration of various facets of herbalism and meaningful sharing of our direct experiences with herbs with the goal of deepening each person's reverence for the power and wisdom of the plants. We will

delight in learning from the plants and each other as we identify, harvest, prepare, and properly use herbs as medicines. Practical details of dosage, mode of use, synergistic combination, toxicity, contraindications, herb-drug interactions, and vitalistic healing will be emphasized. Classes meet weekly (with a break in the middle) to allow students to hone their skills between sessions and to better span the life cycles of the plants as they bud, blossom, and send their seed back to the Earth.

Student practitioners will be introduced to the principles of Traditional Chinese Medicine theory through readings, class lectures and discussions that underlie the practice of Shiatsu and Asian Bodywork. No prior bodywork experience is required. The class will be limited to 12 students in order to facilitate observation and individual support to students during the practical work during class. TOPICAL SEMINAR: ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH & GEOPATHIC STRESS – THE HEALING POWER OF THE EARTH

Can a place make you sick? Can a place bring you wellness. The Earth is a living organism that requires care, nurturance and balance for optimal health. People often consider health issues related to the body or to animals. Few consider the role of “place” in the healing process. Does it matter where a garden is placed to enhance the growth of plants? Can you alter a place to discourage a lightning strike? Why are cows so drawn to certain areas in a field? In this course, places on earth will be examined in their relationship to health using the principles of Chinese Medicine including Qi, Meridians and Acupuncture as part of the ancient practices of Dowsing and Geomancy.

We will explore how ceremonies and rituals are situated in a healthcare and spiritual system. On the Saturday of our class, we will experience the Sweatlodge Ceremony. TOPICAL SEMINAR: HOMEOPATHY – FDA APPROVED!

Most Americans do not know that Homeopathy was considered Conventional Medicine while Allopathic medicine was “Alternative Medicine” in the 1800’s. Most Americans don’t know that Homeopathic Remedies were approved by the FDA in the 1940’s. This introductory course will cover the history of homeopathy, how homeopathy was discovered, and how remedies are prepared. We will learn about the “Law of Cure”, how to select and administer a remedy, dosage instructions, and length of treatment. We will discuss the difference between classical and combination methods, along with the history in the U.S and other countries. Other topics will include additional homeopathic products, first aid remedies, recommended reading for beginners and for intermediate study.

TOPICAL SEMINAR: MASSAGE, SCIENCE & WELLNESS

Massage was introduced to America in the early 1900’s. Back then, it was often associated with prostitution. Today, massage is one of the foremost healing therapies in Mind-Body medicine and the field of Psychoneuroimmunology. Massage is used together with allopathic medicine in some of the top Integrative Medical hospitals in the United States including John Hopkins hospital and the Mayo Clinic. Massage has extensive evidence for enhancing immune response and reducing stress, for creating wellness and for reducing illness. Students will explore the science of massage, learn diverse massage techniques, and also personally experience massage as a tool for health and wellness. TOPICAL SEMINAR: NUTRITION, FOOD & SOCIETY.

This interdisciplinary course will explore the complex role of nutrition in individual lives and the economic and political issues underlying food production, food choice and consequences for personal and environmental health. The basic biochemical foundations of nutritional concepts for individual nutrition will be examined including the dietary reference intake (DRI) committee recommendations for the RDA, AI, and UL for the energy yielding nutrients, vitamins, and minerals. Mainstream and alternative nutritional theories and current controversies will be explored throughout the semester. Students will have the opportunity to examine their own relationship to their personal nutrition, study diverse diet theories, learn nutritional protocols for scientific research and discuss the local, global, and social consequences of food choices.
