WEB RESOURCES

All students considering summer enrollment at JSC should also read the “Steps to Summer Courses” on JSC’s website by visiting www.jsc.edu/summer. Here you will find registration instructions, steps for applying for financial aid, and billing policies.

CURRENTLY ENROLLED STUDENTS PLEASE NOTE:

- Summer semester registration dates and procedures are different from fall and spring semesters.
- In the summer, a separate application for financial aid (see the JSC Summer Payment/Financial Aid Application Form) is required in addition to the usual FAFSA application.

(Individuals without Internet access may contact the Academic Dean’s Office at 802-635-1242 for hard copies of all instructions and forms.)

STUDENTS MAY ALSO ACCESS THE FOLLOWING THROUGH WEB SERVICES

Once registered, students may log onto Web Services through the Blackboard Portal at <http://blackboard.vsc.edu>. New registrants should see the next page for account activation and email policy and procedures.

- Online Search for Sections – Search for the most up-to-date course offering information for summer (and fall) by course subject, meeting days/times, instructor, keyword, and more. Current degree-seeking students who have been approved for online registration may register online for summer courses from March 30 to May 18.
- Course Schedule – After registering, print out your course schedule.
- Unofficial transcript – Print a copy of your unofficial transcript.
- Grades – Grades will not be mailed after completion of your course (s). You may access your grade report through Web Services.

Taking a class at Johnson State College?

Please read carefully

All students are expected to familiarize themselves with the policies and procedures of Johnson State College available online at www.jsc.edu/policiesandprocedures.

Social Security numbers are highly confidential and legally protected data. The Vermont State Colleges are committed to protecting the privacy of VSC employees and students, to the proper handling of social security numbers, and to the overall reduction in the use of social security numbers for business processes. In order to comply with federal law, the VSC requires all students who are U.S. citizens to provide their social security numbers prior to being registered for classes for the first time, except for those students in contract courses that are paid for by an external entity.

Many instructors use Blackboard to post assignments and supplemental course materials, and in the case of online or hybrid courses, regularly accessing the course in Blackboard may be a requirement of the course.

Electronic mail is an official means of college communication with all students. Johnson State College provides students with an email account, free of charge. Students are responsible for all information sent to their college-assigned email accounts. If students choose to forward their college email to another account, they remain responsible for the contents of any official message, including attachments.

JSC expects that students will use VSC Web Services to access their class schedule, unofficial transcript, and grade reports.

Within 48 hours of course registration, all students will receive Blackboard, Email, and VSC Web Services access.

How to access Blackboard, Email, and VSC Web Services

To access Blackboard, email, and VSC Web Services you'll need to activate your account; we recommend doing so before the start of the semester. If you have previously logged onto Blackboard, please follow the instructions in Option 1 (below); otherwise, use the instructions in Option 2 (below). If you experience difficulties accessing your accounts, submit a request for assistance to the Help Desk at <http://helpdesk.vsc.edu>.

1. Log onto your Blackboard account. Click on the Change Password link, located under Tools on the left-hand side of the page. Follow the online instructions to change your password. This process will activate your JSC network and email accounts and set the new password to apply to all of your accounts.

2. Go to <http://blackboard.vsc.edu>. Click on the link located in the New User? section to activate your account. Follow the online instructions to set a new password. This process will activate all of your accounts at the same time. Your username will be listed on the page after you have successfully activated your account. Please note that you will need your College ID# to activate your account. You can obtain your ID# by clicking on the What's My College ID? paragraph on the Blackboard log in page.

Email: To access your email account through Blackboard, click on the Email link on the left side of the screen after logging into Blackboard.

VSC Web Services: VSC Web Services is accessible by logging into <http://blackboard.vsc.edu> and selecting the colored VSC Web Services box on the left and then selecting Students.

DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES ACT

The Congress of the United States passed the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act. The last is another step in encouraging individuals to eschew abuse of alcohol and the use of illicit drugs. Johnson State College (JSC) strongly supports these efforts. Thus, it is the policy of JSC that:

- 1) Unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees on JSC property or as part of any school activity is prohibited.
- 2) JSC will not tolerate the abuse of alcohol or the possession, distribution, or use of illicit drugs. Students and employees who violate this policy

will be disciplined by the College. Such discipline may include the successful completion of an appropriate rehabilitation program, expulsion from school, termination of employment, and/or referral to proper legal authorities for prosecution.

- 3) Unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs or alcohol may result in punishment under state or federal law, including significant monetary fines or incarceration in state or federal prison.
- 4) Students and employees should be aware that the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol will significantly impair their health and may result in susceptibility to serious and life threat-

ening diseases.

- 5) While the college does not provide formal counseling, treatment, or rehabilitation programs for illicit drug use or alcohol abuse, College counselors and others will, upon request and in confidence, provide information on such programs available in the community or state.

Should you have questions regarding this policy, see your supervisor or the Dean of Students. After seeing these people, you may, as necessary, see the President of Johnson State College.

NON-DISCRIMINATION AND PREVENTION OF HARASSMENT AND RELATED UNPROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

Johnson State College (JSC) does not engage in unlawful discrimination based on race, color, creed, ancestry, ethnicity, national origin, place of birth, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, age, veteran status, marital status, or any other status protected by law. Sexual harassment, racial harassment, and harassment of persons based upon other protected categories are forms of discrimination and will not be tolerated. REGULATIONS FOR MEASLES IMMUNIZATION

If you meet the outlined criteria, you must show proof that you have received two doses of live measles vaccine, the first dose being received on or after your first birthday with at least 30 days separating the doses. Any doses given before 1968 must have been documented as having been “live” vaccines. One of the doses must have been after 1980. You must show such proof only once, rather than each semester you register.

Course Descriptions

ANT-4020-J01 MULTICULTURAL STUDIES OF HEALING

Dr. Lewis Mehl Madrona holds an M.D. and Ph.D. and is a noted author of several books including *Coyote Medicine*, a story of himself as a Native American healer attending medical school. In this course, students will learn the often surprising ways that illness plays a role in the way people live and die around the world. Western biomedicine will be compared to other medical systems in the world using a lens of biology, psychology, culture, and environment.

ANT-4710-J01 SPECIAL TOPICS: FIELD STUDIES IN LAMOILLE ARCHEOLOGY

Students travel to Johnson, Vermont, with anthropologist Corbett Torrence to experience hands-on archaeological opportunities. The primary educational aspect provides archaeological training to college-level students and community members through enrollment in a six-credit archaeological field study. The field study will run eight hours a day, five days a week, for five consecutive weeks. Course units include archaeological field techniques, laboratory methods, and artifact analysis and curation. At the termination of each project, artifacts will be ready for curation at the Vermont Division of Historic Preservation. The scientific objective of the project is a multi-phase contribution to our understanding of the Lamoille's culture and environmental history. Phase 1 of the "Lamoille Project" is the "Cambridge-Johnson Project" which focuses on the Lamoille River between the falls in Fairfax and Johnson. Working with local farmers and land owners, our objective is to identify sites along the river and to conduct limited testing to evaluate site significance including size, structure, content, antiquity, and integrity. Students completing this course should have ample employment opportunity in archaeology (see shovelburns.org).

ART-4710-J02 SPECIAL TOPICS: RITES OF PASSAGE

Fran Weinbaum holds an M.A. in Therapeutic Recreation and is the current director of Stillpoint Associates Life Coaching. Fran will help you explore a key question that may transform the way that you live: "What in your life is calling you?" Through readings, discussion, and experiential activities, you will learn to bring creativity and intention to all that you do, recognize and develop your unique talents and gifts, identify and rectify what stands in your way of living well, and take action in your professional and personal life with more confidence, passion, purpose, effectiveness, and joy.

ART-4710-J01 SPECIAL TOPICS: SCULPTURE INSTALLATION, EDUCATION & INSPIRATION

Get outside. Work with your hands. This special topics basic sculpture course addresses questions including: "What is sculpture?" "How does a professional sculptor install his/her work?" "How do I enhance the interest in sculpture which is already within me?" Sculpture – like painting, poetry, and architecture - has humble, ancient roots. This three-week summer course begins with various origins of sculpture and continues

with methods of installation taught by way of assisting Czech-born sculptor, Cestmir Suska, install a site-specific piece called “Endless Table Cloth 2” (a sculpture begun in 2006) on the campus of Johnson State College. Co-taught by Leila Bandar and Suska, this course allows students to gain hands-on experience (with tools and techniques) as well as necessary person-to-person interaction to facilitate their learning. In the second and third week, students apply all methods, ideas, and techniques to making their own outdoor sculptures and/or fountains.

ART-4710-J02 SPECIAL TOPICS: MIXED MEDIA: PAPERMAKING AND PRINTMAKING

Handmade paper and printmaking are a natural combination. Students explore a variety of papermaking methods and combine the results with different printmaking techniques. Students make a variety of papers using recycled materials, plant fibers, glitter, and colored pulps. Using monotype, relief, and collagraph methods, the paper will be used as inspiration and a vehicle to create a series of prints. Collage, embossing, and chine colle can also be explored.

BIO 2130-J01 NATURAL HISTORY OF THE YELLOWSTONE PLATEAU

July 18-26, 2009. Field trip to Yellowstone backcountry. Course fee \$600 (plus transportation costs to and from Salt Lake City, Utah). Class limit: 7. Yellowstone National Park (YNP) is one of the most spectacular natural areas in the world. Well known for its geothermal features, the park is home to more than a thousand species of plants and the largest concentration of free-roaming wildlife in the lower 48 states and the global temperate zone. Students will spend 7 days in the backcountry studying the ecology and geology of Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks. Students must be physically fit (able to jog 3 miles comfortably over rocky terrain); we will be hiking 7-10 miles per day with full packs. Students will need (1) to bring camping equipment (frame pack, sleeping bag, tent, etc.) for this backcountry experience, and (2) arrange their own transportation to and from Salt Lake City. The course fee will cover all meals, transportation from Salt Lake City to YNP, entrance and camping fees, and other materials. For additional information call (802) 635-1693 before 15 May 2009.

EDU-5710-J01 SPECIAL TOPICS: MULTICULTURAL EDUCATION

This course is designed to impart an understanding of multiculturalism in education, and explores the importance of educating for diversity in a pluralistic society. We will critically examine the historical, sociological, cultural, and philosophical foundations of public education. This course will also provide practical tools for pre-service teachers, in-service teachers, and educators in non-school settings to: examine and critique their own teaching practice through an anti-bias, multicultural lens; develop and implement effective multicultural curriculum; and act as change-agents in their learning communities. Students will explore the theory and pedagogical practices of anti-bias multicultural education by examining the work of teacher researchers and practitioners.

HIS-4701-J01 SPECIAL TOPICS: EXPLORING THE 1609 CHAMPLAIN QUADRICENTENNIAL

The summer of 2009 will witness the 400th anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain. It will consist of a suite of academic conferences, commemorations, and other activities. Join JSC Professor Frederick M. Wiseman, Commissioner of the Vermont Lake Champlain Quadricentennial Commission, to observe and participate in the many activities planned for the indigenous Signature Event and the Burlington Waterfront Celebration in Burlington July 5-13, 2009. Students will meet at the ECHO Center in Burlington the week before the Events commence – to learn about the history surrounding the discovery of Lake Champlain. Students will keep a detailed journal of their attendance at events and evaluations of the various commemorative activities. Course projects during the Signature Event will include assisting Professor Wiseman with running the various programs and participating in them; and students will be expected to complete a self-evaluation of their learning experience from the Quadricentennial. This is an opportunity that only comes every 400 years!

SOC-4730-J01 TOPICAL SEMINAR: MASSAGE, SCIENCE, AND WELLNESS

Andrea Altman is completing her M.A. and teaches in the Massage Therapy Certification Program at Community College of Vermont – a program that certifies students to take national certification examination for massage therapy – the gold standard for evaluating massage therapists. You will learn the history, evolution, and nature of multiple massage therapies, experience them directly, and evaluate the scientific evidence for their safety and efficacy in treatment.

SOC-4730-J02 TOPICAL SEMINAR: HERBALISM AS THERAPEUTIC ART

Suzanna Gray-Bliss holds an M.A. in Education, trained as an herbalist with world renowned Rosemary Gladstar at Sage Mountain Center, and is certified as a Clinical Herbalist/Health Care Practitioner.

SOC-4730-J03 TOPICAL SEMINAR: THE ART AND SCIENCE OF ANIMAL COMMUNICATION

Kathy “Keek” Mensing, author of *The Way I Hear Them: Stories of An Animal Communicator* and a future book entitled *The Man Left, The Dog Died, and I Woke Up Psychic*. Keek has a Master’s Degree in Contemplative Psychotherapy. She studied animal communication in Europe and Scotland. Keek communicates with animals from all over the world. She will teach skills and techniques including intuition, mindfulness and visualization to work with animals with behavior problems, animals that are lost or animals that have passed over. Students will learn the history of animal communication (including Project Stargate which was started by the U.S. military in 1971), the nature of evidence supporting this work, and explore its role in contemporary society. “The intuitive mind is a sacred gift.
